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Mayor's Message

If you read newspapers, listen to talk radio, follow a news feed online, or watch the news on television, it seems as if nothing good happens anywhere, ever, to anybody, that our world is in the worst shape in history and things are only going to get much, much worse. On a grand scale, we are bombarded with negativity 24 hours a day by media outlets, and the harsh, unforgiving divide in our political class has been cultivated and exacerbated news media's insatiable appetite for content. If you are wondering why it seems that people in general seem angrier and less civil than ever before, look no further than how our media portrays our world on a daily basis. But, if we're honest about it and apply a bit of perspective, the media, with the complicity of our political leaders, are collectively producing the world's greatest work of fiction. Things are not worse than ever, they're better than ever.

One hundred years ago, we were just emerging from the "war to end all wars" that killed 20 million people and wounded another 21 million. That was just the warm-up. Between 1929 and 1979, we had a worldwide depression, a decade long drought in the Midwest US that resulted in the "Dustbowl," a SECOND world war that resulted in another 75 million deaths, the Korean "conflict," the Cuban Missile Crisis, the assassination of a President, the Vietnam War, and a gas shortage that brought our country to a halt. Compare all that to the last 43 years, and all of sudden things don't look too bad. The big difference is that everything from 1929 through 1979 wasn't televised 24/7/365. Every military conflict, natural disaster, salacious crime, and political conflict is now fodder for hours and hours of media coverage. Congressional hearings are now television shows. If the Dustbowl took place today, it would have its own cable network. Somehow, people slogged through these cataclysmic events and maintained a sense of hope, civility, and community. Unlike today, what was going on in the world didn't take precedence over living their lives.

And that brings us to Oceanport. If we stop looking outward through the prism of the media and start looking inward through the prism of our own experiences, we would begin to appreciate how much we have and how good it is to be living on this planet in 2023. Oceanport, like thousands and thousands of small communities throughout the world, is living proof that the human condition is a good one and that things are not as bad as they seem. Overnight Parking Ban

Please be aware overnight parking on Borough streets is prohibited when the streets are covered in snow – whenever snow has fallen, and the accumulation is such that it covers the streets. The parking prohibition shall remain in effect after the snow has ceased until the streets have been plowed sufficiently and to the extent that parking will not interfere with the normal flow of traffic.

Some Tips on Recycling from the OP Environmental Commission

On behalf of the OP Environmental Commission here are some suggestions we can all do to keep our town at its best. For those of you who are taking advantage of the twice monthly recycling pick-ups it is appreciated. The OP head of public works, Steve Briskey, offered some tips which will help minimize our costs and keep resources out of the landfill.

1. Please break down cardboard boxes and bundle them with twine. Oceanport gets paid for this!
2. It's best to either throw out bottle caps with trash, or leave them on the bottle, since they can clog the processing machine.
3. No plastic bags with the recycling.
4. Continue to bundle your brush or place it in garbage cans or bags. Unfortunately, public works does not have a chipping/mulching machine to process this.
5. Try to keep leaves and other debris away from storm drains to minimize flooding.

Mr. Briskey is willing to open the drop-off center on Saturday mornings if we have volunteers to provide oversight. Anyone interested in volunteering, please email Litwins@com-cast.net. You will have the pleasure to meet fellow Oceanporters and support our town.

Other ways to help conserve and keep our environment cleaner:

Please don't water the lawn if it's rained recently.

Try to minimize idling in your vehicle. DEP regulations limit engine idling to three minutes, with limited exceptions.

Dog and Cat License Information

The Borough of Oceanport requires all dogs and cats to be licensed every year and to have a current rabies vaccine. The State of NJ mandates current as valid through October 31st of the licensing year. Application for new or renewal of license for 2024 is due January 31st, 2024 ONLINE at: [www.sdlportal.com/towns/nj/monmouth/oceanport/requests/pet license](http://www.sdlportal.com/towns/nj/monmouth/oceanport/requests/pet-license).

Fee: \$18 per pet if not spayed/neutered or \$15 per pet if spayed/neutered.

Licenses expire January 31st, 2024 and a late fee applies after February 28th.

Top Reasons to License Your Animal:

- It greatly improves your chance of getting your animal back if it goes missing.
- It lets law enforcement know your animal is up to date on its rabies vaccine.
- Animal license fees fund animal control and assistance for injured animals and wildlife.
- State Law and Borough Ordinance requires dogs and cats to be licensed.
